The Breakdown

- ✓ January 2021 saw 12,100 fewer people in employment compared to December 2020: 5,300 of these employment losses were among people in full-time employment and 6,800 were among people in part-time employment.
- ✓ With Niagara's unemployment rate at 11.6% and our employment rate at 50.1%, January 2021's data are similar to the trends observed during the spring 2020 lockdown.
- ✓ The 24,400 job seekers reported in January 2021 is exactly double the number of job seekers living in Niagara in January 2020.

The Breakdown

- ✓ January 2021's employment declines were concentrated in the services-producing sector. The accommodations and food services sector was hardest hit with 4,200 people losing employment between December and January.
- Both manufacturing and construction saw slight month-over-month employment declines.
- ✓ Wholesale and retail trade's month-over-month employment decline of 3.7% in Niagara is below the 10% decline seen at the provincial level.


The Breakdown

- ✓ January 2021 saw 3,200 fewer youth employed in Niagara: 2,100 of these youth were working in a full-time capacity and 1,000 were working in a part-time capacity.
- Similar to the general labour force, the increases to the youth unemployment rate and decreases in the youth employment rate signal a trend that is similar to what was observed during the Spring 2020 COVID-19 lockdown.
- ✓ Compared to January 2020, there were 7,600 fewer youth employed in January 2021.


A few words on definitions: Monthly labour force survey data defines a youth as an individual age 15 to 24. An individual who is "not in the labour force" is an individual who is neither working nor looking for work. Full-time students are generally considered to be not in the labour force, even if they maintain parttime employment while in education and training.

The Breakdown

- Month-over-month, January 2021 saw 6,000 fewer women in employment and 6,100 fewer men in employment.
- ✓ Year-over-year, January 2021 saw 14,300 fewer employed women and 7,400 fewer employed men compared to January 2020.
- ✓ Women represented 41.3% of full-time employment and 67.5% of part-time work in January 2021.
